## Balaam"s Prayer -- "Not Your Will, But Mine"

## Scripture Reading: Numbers 22-24

Balak, the king of Moab hires a prophet by the name Balaam to speak and prophecy curses on the people of Israel. Balaam said that he would inquire of the lord regarding this and then confirm. He clearly knew that God will not desire nor allow the people of Israel to be cursed. If someone asks you to steal something, will you tell them, "I will inquire of the Lord and respond."? We never do that. Balaam should have refused the offer, but he rather wanted to inquire of the Lord. God answered his prayer and said a "NO" for his request.

Balaam said to Balak the king that he cannot do that. The king then tries to deceive Balaam by sending higher officials and promising him of great honors. Balaam was lured by worldly honors and the riches that were placed before his eyes. The next day Balaam left along with his donkey, two servants and the top leaders of Moab.

One their way, the donkey of Balaam bolted off the road into a field, but Balaam beat her back onto the road. Now they were travelling in a road which had walls on the either sides. The Donkey squirmed past by pressing against the wall, crushing Balaam's foot in the process. So he began to beat her again. Now they were travelling in a very narrow road and the donkey lay down in the road and never stood up. Balaam was raged and took out his staff to hit the donkey.
