Crossing Over of Jordan

Scripture Reading: Joshua 3 and 4

Once a young mountaineer climbed the mount of Alps with the help of an expert guide. While returning, he loosed himself from the safety robe that was attached to the guide and tried getting down with his own skill. After some time he stepped on a heap of snow. His feet slipped over it and he met with a fatal accident. The only mistake he did was to separate himself from the guide. He would've survived if he just obeyed the instructions of the guide.

Now the Israelites had reached the shores of the mighty river Jordan. They did not have boats or bridges. The width of the river was 150 meters.
